From the Voice of Experience

When we share our work, discuss it, and observe how it changes, we learn from each other.

Anne Anderson shared the following with your editor.

I started painting in watercolor years ago until several friends coerced me into trying oils (the messy smelly medium!). For quite awhile friends thought my oils were watercolors because they had the same loose, thin, brushy quality of my watercolors!

Now that I've been painting in oils for such a long time, and they are soooo forgiving (!), I feel like I've lost my touch with watercolors. This reminds me of a conversation with my niece, who could draw fabulous animals when she was four. Four years later, I asked her "How's the art going?" and she said with downcast eyes, "I've lost it!"

I think for me one difference is the choice of palette colors. In watercolor, I use bright transparent colors mostly straight from the tube and blended on the paper. When I started with oils, I used the same palette (transparent Windsor Yellow, Permanent Rose, Ultramarine and Manganese Blue, Sap Green). Now I like the more muted landscape palette made with Cadmium mixes and muted grays. I may go back to a brighter oil palette and I definitely have to get back to watercolor.

And because of you, returning everything to the storage unit was done in one trip versus three. As always, thanks to Frank Sanitate for so many reasons! We had such great help from participants, that taking the show down and packing up took only an hour. Wow! Thank you all!

Kudos to Anne Anderson, Denise Carey, Mary Kelly and Barbara Cronin Hershberg, our cashiers who dealt gracefully with whatever glitches are bound to come with using their phones to process sales. Paula Gregoire-Jones and Dawn King took the photos shown.

The emerald green mountains

and colorful religious festivals in his native rural Mascota, Jalisco, Mexico, were Filiberto's very first memories, making a permanent visual impact that endures today. His lasting memory is of his uncle abruptly pulling a plant out of the ground, and explaining to him

the life cycle of a plant. Filiberto says: "How can you add to the life cycle of a plant? To me that memory is so important. it's the first time I noticed not only one plant, but trees, hills and mountains, even sky. I remember that even today, and try to see the world with the same wonder."

Also as a child, Filiberto saw and absorbed the paintings in the local churches. He eagerly awaited the arrival of each new year with its large calendars depicting the local Mexican agrarian culture. These experiences developed in him a deep appreciation for the spiritual and healing aspects of Nature, and instinctively led him to try to capture them in drawings, although no one around him drew or painted.

Then he arrived in Santa Barbara, a community that values its environment and the arts. Here he was introduced to the formal art world. It fortified his need to continue drawing, and inspired a pursuit of learning how to paint his new surroundings. While working in the SBCC Campus Bookstore, he gained knowledge of all kinds of art materials. He took many SBCC classes in drawing and painting, as well as Art History. This led to an opportunity to

> study abroad in London, Florence, and Paris, where he viewed master works firsthand adding further to his learning experience.

At European museums, he was like a star-struck fan meeting all his favorite artists. The periods of Barbizon, Romantic, Impressionism, and Post-Impressionism interested him above other art movements. This exposure prompted him to

take more classes with local masters, now focusing on plein air painting.

He says: "When we paint outdoors, we discover new places, or paint familiar sites from different points of view, in different seasons, or during a new time of day or climate condition. It keeps me in contact with Nature's never-ending rhythms and changing quality of light."

Filiberto works intuitively, as if letting the painting paint itself, letting it dictate the colors, mood, and strokes. His images are not copies of the scene, but a quick glimpse that captures the essential aspects of the location. Even though a place has been painted a thousand times, it still has thousands of stories to tell.

Filiberto has been fortunate to join many other area artists, painting and exhibiting together. He has assisted Thomas Van Stein in workshops at Mascota, Jalisco, Filiberto's birthplace that is still so close to his heart. He says: "As artists, our intent is to distill pictorially the glories of nature to entice viewers into our artwork, as well as to help them appreciate and experience our endangered environment for themselves."
