


Title: Sunflowers

Tips and Techniques

How do TRANSPARENT and OPAQUE paints differ?

Transparent colors let light pass through while opaque colors obscure the light. Light travels through transparent paint and bounces off the canvas, while light bounces off opaque paint. You can make transparent pigments opaque by adding an opaque paint such as Titanium White. While medium can be added to opaque paint to make it less opaque, opaque paint will never make a good substitute for transparent paint because its chemical makeup is different. Choose transparent colors for glazing.

Indian Yellow In

A TRANSPARENT COLOR WHEEL IS A HANDY REFERENCE FOR GLAZING

This color wheel is made from transparent colors. The oranges were made from two transparent colors, Indian Yellow and Quinacridone Red. The blue-green is a mixture of Viridian, a transparent color, and Ultramarine Blue, a transparent color. The green-yellow is Viridian mixed with Indian Yellow. The yellow-green would be much cooler and purer if it had been mixed with a cool transparent yellow that leaned to the green side such as Hansa Yellow Light. The Indian Yellow leans to the warm orange side, so it grays the blue-green Viridian.

FOR OIL PAINTS

Author's Note:

Applying transparent paint over other transparent paint can create a glowing stained-glass effect. Transparent glazes over opaque paint creates depth and can warm or cool a passage. Artists who include both transparent and opaque paints in their palettes expand their possibilities with paint by taking advantage of a wide array of characteristics.
