


Membership Messages

1099-K Threshold Change:

Beginning January 1, 2024, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) implemented new reporting requirements for payments received for goods and services, which will lower the reporting threshold to \$600 USD for the 2024 tax season from 2023's threshold of \$20,000 USD and 200 transactions.

What is Form 1099-K?

Form 1099-K is an IRS informational tax form used to report payments received by a business or individual for the sale of goods and services that were paid via a third-party network, often referred to as a TPSO or credit/debit card transaction.

The IRS requires TPSOs, such as PayPal and Venmo, to issue a Form 1099-K, which shows the total amount of payments received from a TPSO in the calendar year. Taxpayers should consider this amount with their tax advisor when calculating gross receipts for their income tax return. For more information, visit the IRS website.

Ray Hunter • Intake Art Juror for GVAA March 2024 Goleta Valley Library Exhibit

Ray Hunter was born in Montana and graduated from Eastern Montana College (currently called Montana State University—Billings) in 1971, with a degree in Art Education.

He began studying watercolor painting with a local Montana artist Len Sundell. Later, Hunter relocated to the Pacific Northwest, where he studied with Seattle area artists Deanne Lemley and Jerry Stitt. Hunter has taken workshops with William Ryan, Charles Reid, Alvaro Castagnet and Joe Bohler.

While in the Northwest, Hunter's work was exhibited in multiple art festivals, including the Edmonds Art Festival, and the Mercer Island Art Festival. His work was featured in the Foss Maritime Calendar, and as the Edmonds Art Festival poster artist.

In 1997, Hunter and his family moved to Santa Barbara, California. He became an artist member of the California Art Club and a signature member of the California Watercolor Association and American Society of Marine Artists.

He has had works shown in multiple festivals and venues, including the Santa Barbara Natural History Museum, SCAPE, Santa Barbara Art Walk, Santa Barbara Maritime Museum, Casa Del Herrero, Marin Agricultural Land Trust, and Santa Barbara Club. He is a member the Oak Group, an organization that promotes the preservation of the land.

Since 1997, Hunter's work has shown multiple times in the California Art Club Gold Medal Exhibitions. He is represented by Waterhouse Gallery in Santa Barbara, and Horizon Art Gallery in Jackson, WY.

Why Enter Your Art Into Exhibits?

Lisa Skelly, is not only an award-winning artist, and gallery owner, but she's also an art entrant and winner! With that in mind, we asked for her thoughts on this subject.

"I especially love that we all cheer for and support each other. We truly want our friends and fellow artists to do well. It's an amazing rare community that we're part of. So my advice is to be brave and enter, reach for the stars, dream big, put your work out there and be willing to learn more from entering...."

"Don't think about it; just go for it," says award-winning water-colorist David Poxon. "If you do nothing, then nothing will happen. Be positive and don't get concerned if you don't get an award. Consider it character building; we all know what it feels like!

"There are wonderful additional benefits to entering art competitions. Here are some things that I look to learn about my own work by contemplating these questions:

- 1. Visibility as an artist: Putting your work out there consistently will get you noticed. Believe me when I enter an art competition, I'm looking at all of the other entries. Which ones are my favorite and why?
- **2. Study the top award winners:** What is it about those really good pieces that won them the award? Is it their composition, value structure, skillful confident brushwork? It's probably a combination of all of those.
- 3. Did the artist bravely paint an unexpected and unique viewpoint that set it apart from the other entries? How can you set yourself apart and share your voice in your own work?"

Celebrate your wins and your growth as an artist, then enter your best paintings and good luck to you all!






One of the teachers suggested that I should teach classes in watercolor. So, I did, first teaching several classes in adult education, then shifting to private classes.


I joined GVAA (2001), and SBAA (in 2002). More recently I joined the California Watercolor Society, and both the National and American Watercolor Societies.

Layered recycled wood, rusty screws, tacks, hooks, etc take the quilt designs to an intriguing level with warm earthy colors.

These quilt designs were passed down through Ozella's family, and used as instruction codes to help run-away slaves on the Underground Railroad. 




< Edward Rodgers "Bird" will be shown at the Voice Gallery for the month of March. It is a linocut. "I used releif printing. That is pressing ink on paper."


