

I paint without needing to know where I'm going. I begin with no plan, no sketches, no preconception. I look at the colors laid out on my pallets and feel an inclination toward one, a leaning, an attraction...and it begins.

A mark is made, and the next in relation to the first, and so forth and so on.

This method is both quiet and fervent, creative and destructive. I apply layers and wipe them off, until I am moved into that intuitive nonverbal flow where the expression of the subconscious begins, and the emotional content arrives.

In this state, I work from a vocabulary honed during years of painting from nature, and studying others' works. Color and tone, line and shape, edges, and paint thick and thin form compositions in 2-D and 3-D space. And then when the painting's all done, like Agnes Martin I ask my brain, 'Well – what do you think?'

WORK AND LOVE - Freud says that's what we need. Well, from the age of 19, my work has been painting; love came later.

How this started: When I was at UCSB, in my second art class ever, the visiting painting professor said, "You definitely have an artistic temperament, so if you are serious about being an artist you need to study in New York City". It was a turning point.

I moved to New York City, and went against my parents' belief that the best occupation for a woman was to be a nurse, or a teacher, until she got married. In order not to be influenced by my parents, I put myself though art school by waitressing.

Another turning point: For nine months I worked on a hyper-realistic, life-sized painting of a nude man. When it was finally finished, a gallery director said, "Paint nine more of these and I'll give you a show."

I knew right then that I had to find a different way of painting, or give up painting entirely! This long-term meticulous method was definitely not suited to my personality.

Today I work toward a luscious, more spontaneous and expressive painting. My ongoing aim is to have the emotional content felt directly, rather than known through symbols or a narrative.

My present direction is joining many large paintings in an emotional progression to move the viewer through feelings the way music can. I'm also working to find a curator and museum to display these emotional progressions of paintings. This has turned out to be very challenging. I would be grateful for any help or advice.



along with some note cards and a bin with originals and prints at Gallery 113, La Arcada Plaza, #8.



Abstracting the Landscape

Plein air painting can be intimidating for many aspiring artists due to its unfamiliarity and unique approach. This is especially challenging when trying to create more abstracted works. Here are a few tips to get you started:

- 1. Find a good location with interesting shapes and shadows. I look for unusual shapes and intersections of land lines and man-made elements. Some people like to use the 'notanizer app' to help simplify shapes.
- 2. Think outside the box. Abstract painting is about breaking the rules and moving away from conventional ideas. Try different color combinations rather than relying on the colors you see.
- 3. Use different tools. Experiment with different tools to explore texture, contrast and shapes. Try using a palette knife or twig to draw with.
- 4. Practice, practice, practice! Create several quick thumbnail sketches to simpilfy shapes and let go of details. Paint from your sketch. This can help you figure out what approach to take.

Sometimes I tape off a sheet of watercolor paper into small 4 by 4 inch sections. Working quickly can help me to see and respond in new ways. I am often very surprized when I remove the making tape and reveal these small gems.
